AAAH Research Workshop 18-19th April 2012 at Siam City Hotel, Bangkok

On the 18th and 19th of April researchers from nine AAAH member countries came together for a workshop to draft common protocols for two research themes. These were 'The Emerging role of Private Health Professional Schools in the Asia Pacific Region' and 'The Assessment of Rural Retention Policies in the Asia Pacific Region'.



The workshop was opened by Dr. Viroj Tangcharoensathien on behalf of the AAAH Secretariat. He stressed that this workshop, AAAH's first intersession activity, provided an opportunity to build research capacity in member states, and produce valuable data that can help build our understanding of human resources for health issues in this region.

A total of 32 expressions of interest were submitted prior to the workshop and external

reviewers selected six teams for each of the two themes.

On the topic of private health professional schools the selected research teams were represented as follows: Mr. Mohammad Nuruzzaman came the JP Grant School from Bangladesh, Dr. Augustine Asante represented the Indonesian team, Dr. Evlegsuren Ser-Od came from Mongolia's Ministry of Health, Dr. Susie Perera came on behalf of the Sri Lankan Ministry of Health team, the Thai team was able to send six representatives: Dr. Krisada Sawaengdee, Assistant Professor Dr. Saovaluck Jirathummakon, Ms. Arunrat Kthanthar, Ms. Thanyarat Ongmekiat, Dr. Nantiya Watthayu and Dr. Jaratdao Renolds, and the Vietnamese team from the Hanoi School of Public Health was represented by Assistant Professor Le Cu Linh.

Observers, Ms. Rachel Amiya, a PhD candidate from The University of Tokyo, and Ms. Noppakun Thammatacharee, from Thailand's International Health Policy Programme, also contributed to this theme.

Six teams were chosen to conduct research on the topic of rural retention policies. Unfortunately the Bangladeshi team was not able to send a representative.



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The representatives of the teams who were able to attend were Dr Ji Xu from China's Ministry of Health, Dr. Khampasong Theppanya from the government of Lao, Dr Pyei Phyo from Myanmar's Department of Medical Science, Dr. Thushara Ranasinghe from the Sri Lankan Ministry of Health, and Dr. Khuong Anh Tuan from Vietnam's Health Strategy and Policy Institute. This session was joined by three observers: Dr. Budihardja Singgih from

SEARO, Ms. Akawa Maki from the Japan International Cooperation Agency and Ms. Suzana Mariyam from Thailand's International Health Policy Program.

The AAAH Secretariat provided technical support, and AAAH partners and resource persons, Dr Tim Evans, Professor Rohan Jayasuriya, and Dr. Suwit Wibulpolprasert provided support in the drafting of the common protocols.

Over the two days researchers worked to find shared objectives and methodologies that they could usefully apply to their own country contexts. By the conclusion of the workshop two detailed and well formed common protocols had been crafted, and now researchers will work to add detail relating to their own in-country situations.

There is currently no funding support for these proposals but with a rigorous internal and external review process in place it is hoped that funding will be forthcoming for proposals of a good standard.

We look forward to the AAAH conference in Cox's Bazar this December when we will receive preliminary reports on the progress made in these exciting research projects.

Kenyan Strikes—Staff Retention

Public Health workers in Kenya have ended a strike, over pay and conditions, which had paralysed public health care. Workers complained that decades of under-investment in healthcare had left public services so poor that sometimes three patients must share a bed, and doctors and nurses must work without basic equipment like gloves or surgical masks. Women deliver babies on the floor. A deal was reached after the government promised to address the workers' demand for pay raises in July, and withdrew a threat to fire 25,000 of the reported 40,000 striking members of the union.


